A recent tea tasting at Swan's Café located within the lobby of The Boston Park Plaza Hotel & Towers brought a new dimension to the activity known as "afternoon tea." Try a Green Tea or Apple Mar-Tea-ni all made with tea and a whole lot of alcohol. Of course, there are the regular blends of exotic teas that are equally as exciting, albeit non-alcoholic.

Even the food is processed with tea. The salmon or Tea Cured Gravlax was to die for, as was the tea-rubbed pork, but let's get back to the bar with a delicious white port infused with tea. Yum!

"Fine tea is like fine wine," said Cynthia Gold, the only tea sommelier in Boston and one of just six in the world, "and a tea cocktail has the perfect balance. With caffeine to energize you, alcohol to relax you and antioxidants for your good health, what more could you want?"

Yes, ma'am. I couldn't agree more. I'm feeling healthier with every sip. I'll have another tea cocktail, please.

Inventive blends of non-alcoholic teas are also available, and they are equally as exciting. Gold knows her stuff as she passionately discusses tea. "I started as a chef and was looking to put together a particular tea list for the restaurant, so I began studying tea," Gold said, "It wasn't long before I was cooking with tea and attracting attention from tea experts in the industry."

During a trip to China, Gold experienced tea farming, and soon after she visited tea estates in India. "The trip was a life-changing experience for me. I learned a great deal from working in the fields and going through the process of preparing tea for consumption," she said.

For the past three years, Gold has incorporated her culinary and tea expertise with her creativity, producing special tea events for the hotel, including a recent "tea wedding." "I worked with the bride and groom regarding which teas were to be served, and the dinner included a tea and spice-rubbed pork tenderloin, a tea-cured salmon all paired with the appropriate teas." Gold created a custom tea blend to the bride's specification to pair with the wedding cake. It was a complete tea event from cocktails to dinner.

So, the next time your old tea-toting auntie comes to town, take her to tea at the Swan's Café. She'll love it.

According to Marriott spokesperson Lucy Slosser, this constantly booked facility is "one of the busiest ballrooms in Boston."
